Alice was born in Nauvoo in 1841. Her family suffered persecutions, after the death of the Prophet. They were forced to leave everything and went to Winter Quarters. They made preparations to come to the Valley. She was 7 years old at this time. She walked all the way beside her mother. Their first winter was spent in a tent which was often blown down. Food was scarce and only through prayers were they able to survive the cold and near starvation.

Alice was married to Morris David Rosenbaum in 1858. They became the parents of 13 children. They moved to Mink Creek, Idaho. Because of the hard

work and strain, Morris died. After her husband died, Alice moved to Brigham City. She bought a home across from the Railroad Station, west of Forrest Street. Her journal was destroyed by a fire.

She was secretary of the Relief Society in 1890 of the Mink Creek Ward. She was a good mother and it is said when anyone needed her, she was always there for them. She died in Brigham City at the age of 73.

Alice was born in Illinois in 1841. Her father was a Jew and had studied to become a rabbi. He studied medicine and dentistry, married a Christian woman, and they became converted to the LDS Church. After their conversation in 1841, they emigrated to Nauvoo where Alice was born. Her father instructed Joseph Smith in Hebrew and German. They came to the Great Salt Lake Valley in September of 1848. Her father began his practice as a dentist and also engaged in the manufacture of sulphur matches.

At age sixteen, Alice married Morris David Rosenbaum who came to Salt Lake City in 1854 and later joined the LDS Church. They made their home in Salt Lake City where they became the parents of two children. They were sealed by Brigham Young on July 2, 1858. In 1861 they went to Brigham City and bought a place. They added eleven more children to their family. They were one of the Pioneer Merchants of Brigham City. Alice gave permission for Morris to marry a widow, Abigail Harriet Snow Caldwell (daughter of Lorenzo Snow). In 1880 Morris was sent to preside over the North German Mission. The families

worked hard and took care of themselves for the years their father was gone. He died in Mink Creek, Idaho when his daughter, Bertha, was nearly two years old. Alice raised her family alone, was a widow for twenty-nine years before her death at age seventy-two.

ALICE NEIBAUR ROSENBAUM

Alice Neibaur was born in Nauvoo, Illinois on 22 May 1841. Her parents were Alexander Neibaur and Ellen Breakell Neibaur. While living in Nauvoo, Alice's father helped to build the Temple. He also taught Joseph Smith in the German and Hebrew languages.

After the Prophet's death they were forced to leave Nauvoo and travel through Iowa to Winter Quarters. Here they made preparation for a long journey across the plains. Alice was seven years old at this time. She walked all the way beside her mother who had a sick baby in one arm and was guiding cattle with the other. They arrived in the Valley on 24 Sep 1848, traveling with the Hiram Clark Company. Their first winter was spent in a tent that would blow down and leave them unprotected. Food was scarce and only through prayers were they able to survive the cold and starvation.

Alice was married to Morris David Rosenbaum 2 Apr 1858, in Salt Lake City by her father, Alexander Neibaur. She was then 17 years. They became the parents of 13 children: Sarah, 23 Sep 1859; David, 11 Mar 1861; Ellen, 17 Nov 1862; Fanny, 6 Nov 1864; Alice, 22 Jan 1866; Morris, 30 Jul 1867; Alexander, 13 Sep 1869; Aaron, 17 Oct 1871; Joseph, 21 Jan 1874; Margaret, 18 Aug 1877; Leah, 16 Nov 1879; Abigail, 30 Mar 1882; Bertha, 26 Dec 1883.

Before the last two children were born, Alice's husband was called on a mission to his native Germany, but was not successful in converting his family there. He died in Mink Creek, Idaho, 8 Aug 1885. Alice served as Secretary of the Relief Society in Mink Creek in 1890, and kept good records. However, her journal was destroyed by a fire while living in Mink Creek. After her husband's death she moved to Brigham City with her two small girls, a son and a grandson. She died 13 Mar 1914 in Brigham City.

While living in Nauvoo, her father helped build the Temple, and also became friendly with the Prophet Joseph Smith, who told him of his many visions and interesting things to hear thru a Prophet. Her father taught Joseph Smith the German and Hebrew Language.

They suffered persecutions along with the other Saints, and were driven from their homes. Alice was seven months old at this time.

They went into Montrose Iowa then to Bonaporte, on to Council Bluff Iowa. By Sept 28 they reached Winter Quarters. Her Mother gave birth to a baby girl, who they named Rachael. She was stillborn.

Preparation for the long journey began 19 Feb 1848. On May 20 they started on the long journey across the plains and arrived in Salt Lake Sept. 24, 1848.

Alice was seven years old at this time. She walked all the way beside her mother who had a sick baby in one arm and was guiding the cattle with the other.

Their first winter was spent in a tent that would blow down and leave them unprotected. Food was scarce and only thru prayers was they able to survive the cold and starvation.

Alice was the fifth child out of thirteen.

Her father, Alexander Neibaur, married her to Morris David Rosenbaum 2 April 1858, in Salt Lake City. She was then seventeen years old. They had a large family, as their family grew they added on to their house.

About this time Alice's husband was called on a mission to Germany, his birthplace. His family didn't accept him because he had joined the Church and wouldn't talk to him. He felt badly because he felt he had an important message for them. On his return home he and Alice had two more daughters, Abigail and Bertha.

They took their daughters to Mink Creek, Idaho to live where her father had employment. He ran a post office and a store. This is where Alice was baptized at age eight years of age.

Because of all the work and strenuous activities, he dropped dead in the street. This was Aug. 8, 1885.

Alice was secretary of the Relief Society there in 1890 as was written in the history of Mink Creek.

After her husband died Alice moved to Brigham with her two small girls, a son, and grandson. They bought a place across the street from the Railroad station, west of Forrest Street. *[There is also a picture of this home but is a bad photocopy.]*

Alice was a good mother and it was said, when anyone needed her, she was there for them.

Her journal was destroyed by fire while living in Mink Creek.

We deeply regret not having this history. She died the year I was born. I am her granddaughter, Evelyn S. Smith, 1914.
